

MISSION SERVICES

The goal of Mission Services is to help individuals increase skills with their daily living activities so they can live as independently as possible. From classroom learning to on-the-job experiences, Goodwill programs help people realize their potential — while earning wages during these learning opportunities. Residential services are designed to help people with disabilities live in their own home or with up to three roommates. Direct service workers provide instruction and support in everything from budgeting to housekeeping for more than 250 people in northeast lowa.

LITERACY PROGRAM

Developing an interest in reading at an early age can make a huge difference in a child's life. Goodwill's partnership with Cedar Valley Readers and other community organizations, allows us to provide quality childrens books for the Cedar Valley Readers,' Little Free Libraries, Booking Brighter Futures, Reach Out & Read programs and much more. Goodwill also provides cookbooks to the Northeast Iowa Food Bank that are distributed along with pantry items to the food insecure of our community.

JOBS SKILLS TRAINING EXPANSION

We have partnered with the Northeast Iowa Food Bank to expand our mission through a job skills certification training program that ensures trainees acquire the essential skills needed to obtain a job upon graduation. Goodwill secured a contract with the Clean Environment Products Company as their national fulfillment center for various environmentally-friendly cleaning products. Goodwill workers packaged, processed and shipped the cleaning products.
